Annual Address Given by President of A. B. A.

Flays Layman for Not Aiding Lawyers in Government

Guy A. Thompson, President of the American Bar Association, in his annual message, answered the laymen's indictment of the Bar and exhorted them to lend their aid in its reformation, instead of allowing all the burden to rest upon the shoulders of the lawyers of this country. Discussing "The Lawyer, the Layman and the Public Good," Mr. Thompson called upon the layman as voter, juror and citizen to cooperate to bring about reforms which lawyers alone are powerless to effect, in defending the profession against this indictment, which is in three counts.

The first count charges that justice and the law are uncertain; the second, that the Bar is slothful in ridding the profession of unscrupulous members, and the third, that the legal profession does nothing to improve the administration of justice.
